PROCEDURES & RESPONSIBILITIES for ENTERING EXHIBITS & FLOWERS

- (1) Read the S.O.O.S. show Rules & Regulations. It is your responsibility to follow them or risk disqualification.
- (2) THE SCHEDULE HAS BEEN REVISED TO REFLECT THE NEW NOMENCLATURE USED TO PRODUCE THE **2017 MID-AMERICA CLASS LIST FOR GENERA**
- (3) CLASS FOR NOVICE GROWERS*
- *A NOVICE GROWER is defined as a grower who has never won a ribbon or trophy at an orchid show for an exhibited orchid. The Novice must have grown the plant for at least six (6) months. All novice plant entries will be considered in one class- Class ----- 8
 - (4) CLASS FOR JUNIOR GROWERS** NEW
- **NEW**. A JUNIOR GROWER is defined as a grower who is 19 years and under. The Junior must have grown the plant for at least six (6) months. All junior plant entries will be considered in one class- Class..... 9
 - (5) The LOCATION NUMBER is the number on your designated EXHIBIT area.
 - (6) Each Exhibitor within an Exhibit must have a separate EXHIBITOR NUMBER in order to enter plants for judging.
 - (7) The most efficient way to enter your plants is online before arriving at the show site. Deadline for online entries is Friday 12:00 noon. Your tags will then be ready soon after 4:00pm on the day of setup. Go to www.SOOS.ca and follow the instructions. Enter all the plants that you might possibly use. Entries may be deleted on day of set-up.

OR

- (8) Make a list of plants to be judged, giving parentage for all hybrids and showing the class number into which, you wish them entered. Also, state any previous awards. PLEASE type or print LEGIBLY, our staff is not trained in hieroglyphics & will return any illegible entries. Your tags will be ready as available, by 9pm. If you want them earlier then register online by 12:00 noon Friday.
- (9) When the computer lists are returned please check for errors & fasten the tags to the appropriate plants. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure all required entries are included; i.e. was your display **entered**?

S.O.O.S. ORCHID SHOW RULES OF ENTRY

The Valentine's Orchid Show, sponsored by the Southern Ontario Orchid Society, will be held at the Toronto Botanical Garden Friday, February 8, 2019 to Sunday, February 10, 2019.

This year's show theme is ${\it OBSESSION}$

- 2. Each exhibitor agrees, upon entry, to abide by the Rules and Regulations of the show. All questions regarding the interpretation of these Rules or Regulations shall be referred to the General Show Chair for a decision.
- 3. Exhibitors must set up exhibits from 12:00 noon to 10:00 p.m. on Friday February 8, 2019. Entries will be accepted for judging only up to 8:00 p.m. Late entries may be exhibited but will not be judged. All exhibits must be left in place until 5:15 p.m. Sunday, February 10, 2019.

- 5. There are no fees to the exhibitor for entries or assistance in setting up exhibits.
- 6. Neither the Toronto Botanical Garden nor the Southern Ontario Orchid Society is responsible for the loss or damage of any plants, blooms, corsages, containers or other property of exhibitors. However, every precaution will be exercised for their safety.
- 7. Reasonable effort will be made to provide the space requested, but the Show Committee reserves the right to limit space allocated to individual exhibitors.
- 8. Standard tables skirted with brown or black material will be furnished without cost; however, the exhibitors must furnish any other staging materials.
- 9. Foliage plants, moss, etc. may supplement exhibits, but neither artificial nor dyed flowers, moss or dyed foliage of any kind is permitted, with the exception of artificial grass used as a floor covering. Plants in flower or cut flowers other than orchids will not be permitted in an exhibit except for corsages and arrangements where orchids must predominate. No dyed flowers will be permitted in exhibit or sales area.
- 10. All plants or cut flowers exhibited must be properly labeled without identification of the owner until judged. SOOS will provide display identification cards after judging.
- 11. Any specimen plant entries in class 101(Specimen plants) must have been the property of the exhibitor for at least one (1) year.
- 12. For purposes of this schedule "hybrid" means a cross made within the genus listed, unless preceded by the word "intergeneric", in which case two or more different genera are used in the cross.
- 13. The appropriate class for intergeneric hybrids shall be the first class for intergeneric crosses which lists one of the genera making up the hybrid. (See lists of genera belonging in each class at registration desk).
- 14. Colour Definition:
 - a. In general, blush colours and two-toned flowers should be entered in the "Other Colours" classifications with the exception of Phalaenopsis which has a dedicated blush class.
 - b. Colour in Paphiopedilum hybrids is based on the dominant flower colour.
- 15. The same exhibit cannot be entered in more than one class. Any individual plant or cut flower can be entered in **one of classes**10 100 and in class 101 (Specimen). Entries in class 8 or 9 may also be entered in the appropriate class 10 101.

 No other double entries permitted.
- 16. ORCHIDS GROWN FOR UNUSUAL FOLIAGE: There are only TWO classes for foliage plants; Class 98 for ALL Jewel Orchids, or 98A FOR ALL OTHERS. Any plants without flowers entered into other classes will be disqualified automatically.
- 17. All exhibits, plants, and cut flowers must be officially entered by class with the Entry Committee to be considered for ribbon judging. Cut flowers and flowering plants shall be considered equally in judging.

- 18. In order to sell orchid plants or other materials at the show, an exhibitor must place in the show, on day of setup, an exhibit of at least 11 orchid plants or cut inflorescences, or an educational display of at least 5 lineal feet, per 5-foot sales table. Display quality must conform to the quality of the show. Both the exhibit and the sales area of each vendor will be evaluated. Any plants sold out of an exhibit shall not be removed from the exhibit before the show is closed. (Sun 5:15 pm) All plants sold must be properly labeled with genus and grex.
- 19. **Judging** will begin promptly at 8:00 a.m. Saturday, February 9 2019. Judges and clerks are expected to familiarize themselves with the show rules and regulations. Only properly authorized persons, will be permitted in the show area during judging. The decisions of the judges shall be final.
- 20. Entries not in accordance with the schedule will be disqualified, and the Show Committee reserves the right to remove all inferior exhibits or any part of them. Diseased or pest infested plants will be removed by the show committee as soon as discovered.
- 21. First, second and third place **ribbons** may be awarded in each class at the discretion of the judges. **Trophies** will be awarded as designated. Judges have the authority to award or withhold any ribbon or trophy and may subdivide any class where warranted.

AOS Judging and Awards

An American Orchid Society (A.O.S.) sanctioned show must comply with the current rules of the American Orchid Society **Handbook on Judging and Exhibition** and any interim rules issued by the A.O.S. **Judging Committee**.

At the show, there must be three or more judges accredited by the American Orchid Society (A.O.S.). The decisions of these judges will be final.

In addition to the ribbons and/or trophies awarded, the judges may consider plants and flowers for American Orchid Society awards. Each person entering plants or flowers in the show agrees to accept and pay for any award given. If an entrant does not wish to accept the A.O.S. awards granted, this must be indicated when entering the plants for ribbon judging.

As a thank you to our exhibitors who bring their best plants for our show, SOOS will pay for all AOS awards granted at the Feb 9-10, 2019 S.O.O.S show.

IF THE FLOWERS HAVE BEEN PREVIOUSLY EXHIBITED AT AN A.O.S. APPROVED FUNCTION, THEY ARE CONSIDERED TO HAVE BEEN SCREENED AND, THEREFORE, ARE NOT ELIGIBLE FOR FURTHER CONSIDERATION. THEY SHOULD BE MARKED "NOT FOR AOS JUDGING". THIS WILL NOT DISQUALIFY THE FLOWER FROM CONSIDERATION IN THE APPROPRIATE RIBBON OR TROPHY CLASS.

- 6. Educational exhibits, not previously exhibited at a SOOS show.
- 7. Display of **ANY** number of flowering orchid plants, cut inflorescences or orchids grown for unusual foliage **SOCIETY Display**

A NOVICE GROWER is defined as a grower who has never won a ribbon or trophy at an orchid show for an exhibited orchid. The novice must have grown the plant for at least six (6) months

A JUNIOR GROWER is defined as a grower who is 19 years and under. The Junior Grower must have grown the plant for at least six (6) months.
